## THE DAY THE VEGETABLES CAME TO SCHOOL



one behind the other.






Raju walked faster and faster.


He was full of curiosity about his new schoolmates,
and wanted a closer look at them.





Just as he had guessed, the shapes were really vegetables: potatoes, sweet potatoes, yams, and all the other root vegetables he had seen in the market.












Raju nodded. He didn't know what to say. He continued on his way to school.





By and by, the parade reached the school. All the children came to the door to watch the strange procession. Their mouths fell open at the sight. School Their eyes were round with astonishment.








Raju was fully awake now. "I've been dreaming," he said to himself. "What a strange dream I've had!"
